As far back as Richard Wilkins can recall, he has always wanted to fly. As a young boy in Cleveland, Ohio, he'd run outside and look up every time he heard an airplane. He wondered why he was so drawn to flight. A pastor once answered, "I don't know, but God will show you. He knit you together in your mother's womb, created you uniquely suited to do what only you can do. God plants the seed, and we are to grow and harvest the fruit."

and power plant mechanics, air traffic control, and other aviation fields. At 17, he moved to Tulsa, Oklahoma, to attend the Spartan School of Aeronautics, where he earned his private, instrument, and commercial certificates while working full time to pay for tuition. That gave him an advantage over the vast majority of hopeful applicants in the U.S. Army flight program.

Warrant Officer Wilkins flew Chinooks. Trained by Vietnam-era pilots, he flew important and sometimes dangerous (low-level night) missions at the border between North and South Korea, in Honduras, and Guatemala. Chinooks were fun to fly, and he often mused, "They pay me to do this! I'd do it for free!"

But there were always two things he said he wanted to be when he grew up: a pilot and a doctor.

After ten years, he set down the helicopter and entered medical school, followed by another ten years of service as an Army doctor to soldiers and their families. After retirement, they didn't want to let go of him, so he agreed to stay on as a civilian physician, serving Army families another seventeen years.

These days, it's not unusual to see him landing or taking off from Liberty Municipal Airport in a Cessna 210 Centurian. But where is he going?


Through worship, prayer, fasting, and studying his Bible, he's learned how to plant – churches, that is.

While searching for answers to why he didn't see God's miraculous healing today as described in the Bible, he was led to the Friday night home church that would eventually become Encounter, across FM 160 from the main entrance to the Liberty airport. While helping to plant churches across the U.S., from Blythe, California to Dover, Delaware, and many places between, Dr. Wilkins has developed more faith in healing through prayer than through medicine. He describes witnessing the casting out of demons and healing from terminal illnesses, exactly what he had prayed to see, and credits God alone.

With all the places the church wanted to go to to scout new locations and spread the Gospel, airline service wouldn't do. To be effective, they needed a time machine. One with wings. One kept close by and ready to fly on their schedule.

Today, when Dr. Wilkins lifts off from Liberty, he's not just flying – he's answering a calling that's been guiding him since childhood.


will also take place at the luncheon. Tickets for both the four-wheeler raffle and the annual gumbo luncheon can be purchased from any Rotary member.


