Linda: I felt brave and daring when, at 13, I borrowed one of my parents' cars to drive my little sister around on her paper route, because she didn't feel like walking it. I was careful, and they never found out until I 'fessed up years later. But a car was all I borrowed. That's a few levels down from Brownsville, Texas, native Kris Kristofferson "borrowing" an Army helicopter.

Mike: Kristofferson was an Army brat who became an Army Ranger and helicopter pilot. However, he

left the service to pursue his dream of being a musician, even turning down an opportunity to teach literature at West Point. His father was a pilot in the US Army Air Corps and later became a Major General in the US Air Force when the two branches of the military were separated. His grandfather had also been a General.

While pursuing his musical dream, he took several odd jobs that might give him access to Nashville's movers and shakers. Like sweeping the floors at Columbia Records. But he had a young family, and medical bills for one of his children were a heavy financial burden, so he took a job as a commercial helicopter pilot. During the week, he flew back and forth from Lafayette, Louisiana, to oil rigs in the Gulf. One week on, one week off gave him time to hawk his songs in Nashville. And there were plenty of idle hours on those oil rigs, which Kristofferson took advantage of, writing songs like Help Me Make It Through the Night and Bobby McGee.

But he was also flying helicopters for the Tennessee National Guard.

And that is how he got hold of the Bell UH-1 Huey he used to introduce himself to Johnny Cash. Kristofferson later called it "kind of an invasion of privacy that I wouldn't recommend," and claimed Cash probably wasn't home at the time. But accounts differ as to what really transpired that day.

While working as a janitor, he had met June Carter Cash and gave her a couple of tapes of his songs. She passed them on to Johnny, who added them to a pile of tapes from other folks that he never got around to listening to. But Kristofferson wouldn't give up. He took the helicopter on one of his weekend reserve duty days and landed smack-dab in the middle of the Cashes' back yard.

The way the story goes, June came out and yelled "Sweet Jesus, they come to us up the road and now they are coming to us out of the sky!" Despite being ordered to leave, Kristofferson wouldn't budge until Cash listened to one of his songs. Upon hearing Sunday Morning Coming Down, Cash reportedly melted and agreed to record the song. It became song of the year, and the two men later performed it together on Cash's 1978 Christmas show.

Fans have their favorites. Personally, I love Sky King, which Kristofferson sang to the tune of Jimmy Dean's Big Bad John.
