Mike: What's the longest flight you've ever been on? Currently, Singapore Airlines operates the longest commercial flight: New York to Singapore, nearly 10,000 miles in just over 18 hours and 30 minutes. These flights are made without refueling. On trips that long, the crew must take breaks and nap. They bunk above the ceiling of the main cabin or in other non-passenger areas of the plane. But what about military jets? How long can they fly?

My cousin, now retired from the Air Force and flying for Jet Blue, spent 12 of his 22 years of service flying transport aircraft, Lockheed C-5 Galaxies. During the war in Somalia, he flew C-5s between Travis Air Force Base in California and Mogadishu. Most Air Force aircraft can be refueled in the air and thus can fly around the world without landing. Therefore, these "heavies" often carry three full flight crews, rotating the flying duties and rest time. When not flying, they spend their time in a ready room behind the cockpit or in a bunk room even further back. Once the cargo is dropped off, which might include two M1A1 Abrams battle tanks or five Bradley

armored transports, and up to 80 combat troops and their gear, the crews may spend 18 hours flying empty to pick up more equipment and troops.

The troop compartment is above the main cargo hold behind the wing, whereas the flight deck and flight crew ready and rest areas are also above the cargo hold but in front of the wing. Both require a retractable ladder to reach. With an empty cargo hold, the crewmembers and any troops riding in the back often spend their time jogging or playing Nerf football. Imagine some officers grabbing you for a toss. A weight room and sauna might be pushing it, but that would be cool.

Fighter jets, on the other hand, have a shorter range and take some looking after on the long haul. The pilots rendezvous with an aerial tanker, meeting up to connect to the refueling straw poking out the tanker's back end. These quick and nimble jets depend on the airborne gas stations. One tanker leads a gaggle of six fighter jets across the open ocean, three forming up on each side, following the mothership. Fighter pilots fly for hours in a tight cockpit, monitoring the fuel gauges. After a while, another tanker meets up to relieve the first one, and depending on the length of the flight, sometimes even a third flying gas tank.

Pilots flying the big iron can enjoy some mental break time. There is a joke that is as old as time (which I'll modify slightly), where a fighter pilot pulls alongside a transport, says over the radio, "Watch this!" and performs a fast roll to show off.

The transport pilot responds, "That's nice. Watch this."

After a while, the fighter pilot says, "I didn't see you do anything."

Liberty City Manager Bryan Kendrick gives his report

LIBERTY agenda provides an opportunity for the City Manager to update the City Council and the public on key ongoing and upcoming City projects and initiatives.

Water System Maintenance: Crews continue to address water leaks on a maintenance-response basis, resolving issues as they arise. As of last week, there were two active leaks throughout the city. Should the volume exceed the internal capacity to respond in a timely manner, outside contractors will be brought in to assist as needed.

Lakeland Drive Water Leak: On August 18, at approximately 10 a.m., a mower struck an old pipe from a previously removed fire hydrant. To minimize the impact of service disruptions, a contractor was called to install a valve to cut the

water off. Upon arrival, it was determined that the contractor did not have the proper tools or capacity to complete the repair. By 4 p.m., the decision was made for the contractor to leave, and the Water Department assumed responsibility for the work. This resulted in widespread outages throughout the city. Service was fully restored by approximately

Main and Texas Street Drainage: After numerous emails and voicemails to TxDOT, a decision was made to repair the drainage issue on Main Street at Texas. The Street Department grassed the ditches from the LISD Administration Office south to Maple Street. The Water Department jetted the culverts and used the vacuum truck to remove mud and debris from the culverts.

Line Improvements: This project is currently 100 percent complete. The final walk-through was completed August 27.

Splash Pad: The Lib-

erty Municipal Park Splash Pad was officially closed September 2. Construction will begin on the brand-new splash pad coming in Spring 2026!
