Edible Words

Food is not only often on our minds, but also on our tongues! For more than 2,500 years we have used verbal expressions related to food. The undisputed winner was to tell someone to, "eat crow." Why so do we not say, "eat cow" or "eat kangaroo"?

We go back to 1888 toward the end of the War of 1812 and join an encounter between an American and British officer. The Atlanta Constitution published an account of the incident in which an American soldier was captured when hunting behind British lines, together with his prey of several

The British officer complimented the American on his outstanding shooting prowess, while persuading the American to turn over his gun. The Brit then said as punishment for trespassing, the American had to take a bite of the foul tasting meat from one of the crows he had killed illegally.

The American "ate crow," but retaliated when his gun was returned by making the British officer eat the remainder of the slain crow. (Neither of these two guys appears in hindsight to have been very bright!) The expression became a description of having to admit a mistake publicly as the humiliating equal of physically having to eat the foul tasting meat of a

If you traveled to England, a similar expression would involve, "eating humble pie." Why would being humble relate to a negative punishment involving a pie? Drop the "h" and you have the word "umble" which refers to the innards of a deer including the entrails. The less desirable "umbles" would be used in medieval times in preparation of a pie for the servants and others sitting "below the salt" or at the lower tables in the lord's hall.

The first literary mention of "eating humble pie" occurred in 1663 when Pepys in his diary stated, "Mrs. Turner came in and did bring us an Umble-pie hot out of her oven, extraordinarily good." To "eat humble pie" then has nothing to do with humility, but everything to do with eating almost inedible deer guts!

What about being told to "Eat your words!," meaning you shouldn't have said what you did, so dispose of the expressed thoughts by eating and swallowing your spoken words to take them back and dispose of them. The namesake for Calvinism, John Calvin, in 1571 in one of his tracts written about Psalm 62 stated, "God eateth not His words when He hath once spoken." In other words, God's Word is never wrong and thus He never has to retract what He says.

If we are discussing eating inedible objects such as words, we should inquire about the origin of. "Eat my hat." Give credit to Charles Dickens in his Pickwick Papers in 1836 where we read, "If I knew as little of life as that, I'd eat my hat and swallow a buckle whole." While "Eat my hat" became a common expression, "swallow a buckle whole" has been rather slow to catch on.

The prize for oldest known food expression goes to "Eat your heart out." The winner is no less than Homer's Illiad classic written about 850 BC in which Homer is sarcastically touting a positive happening to an associate who did not succeed with instructions for how the unsuccessful associate should act. Frankly speaking, there are several things "eating on me" at present caused by issues from current events that chap my - "uh oh" - you can figure that one out on your own!
