This year let us celebrate Thanksgiving now as in the original setting in 1620, remembering the reasons and who we celebrate on this special holiday. William Bradford was the leader and second governor of Plymouth Colony where he served for 51 years, including the first Thanksgiving on December 13, 1621.

Frankly Speaking –

Bradford, in his writings, reported the first

winter in 1620 was a series of tragedies, even though it could have been worse if corn stored by the Indians had not been found and the Pilgrims had been unable to build their first homes of twigs mud. Bradford claimed it was a miracle and only due to the deep faith of the colonists in God that they survived and stayed. That first winter in the colony an astounding 51 of the 102 Pilgrims died from a strange disease, including 13 of 24 heads of family, 20 of 24 mothers in the colonies and the first governor, John Carver.

Render Thanksgiving Now as Then!

No one protested or rioted or asked for redistribution of scarce resources: they prayed and worked at whatever needed to be done. In spite of the adversities and diminished numbers, during the next year the colony grew and succeeded with ample crops and game in the storage. This success led to the first Thanksgiving being decreed to be celebrated on December 13, 1621. The public notice William Bradford posted as governor set forth both his original and our reasons today for celebrating Thanksgiving,

TO ALL YE PILGRIMS

In as much as the great Father has given us this vear an abundant harvest...and has made the forest to abound in game and the sea with fish...and inasmuch as He has protected us from the ravages of the savages, has spared us from pestilence and disease, has granted us freedom to worship God according to the dictates of our own conscience; now I do proclaim that all ye Pilgrims...do gather at ye meeting house...and render thanksgiving to ye Almighty God for all His blessings.

There is hope Christianity will be given the same treatment and respect as other faiths. Our forefathers in America had no doubt who was responsible for their blessings and survival. As in that first Thanksgiving, we as a nation and as individuals more than ever need to thank our God for all His blessings given to us and His miracles that have enabled us to have ample food stores for winter, protection from savages and warm homes while being spared from a national disease crisis.

We are blessed, as were the first Pilgrims, to have freedom of religion even though assailed; the right to bear arms even though attacked; and freedom of speech even though now too often filled with public filth. Give thanks and recognize we are not victims, but citizens of the greatest nation in history – the United States of America. Certainly we have shortcomings as a nation, but we have much more to be proud of in our brief history and rather than changing it, we should honor it.

Let us give thanks for the blessings the U.S. has brought to so many in the world and to be positive rather than apologetic for our forefathers and those who have sacrificed so much to assure our freedoms. It is time to recognize, not ignore and denigrate, our founding Fathers and our military and civilian heroes. Let us all read Psalm 107 as one of thanksgiving that was read at the First Thanksgiving in 1621 and should be read each year at our personal Thanksgiving celebrations.

Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; his love endures forever... ..Let them give thanks to the Lord for His unfailing love and His wonderful deeds for men...

Frankly speaking, may God bless you, may God bless America, and may we all have a Happy Thanksgiving by "...rendering thanksgiving to Almighty God for all His blessings," as did the first Pilgrims and their leader who recognized God, not government, was the source of true blessings!
