The LTVBC has been supporting birding, nature, and conservation since 1992.


Next SHC Book Club meeting coming up Oct. 28

LIBERTY - Join other readers in a discussion of Anthony Doerr's Cloud Cuckoo Land at the October meeting of the SHC Quarterly Book Club. The club will meet Tuesday, Oct. 28, from 6-7 p.m. at the Sam Houston Regional Library and Research Center (SHC). The selected novel, which was a finalist for the National Book Award in 2021, involves multiple characters connected through the centuries by an ancient work called Cloud Cuckoo Land. This event is fun and free with no membership or registration required.

Featuring fictional works with a connection to the world of museums, archives and libraries. the Sam Houston Center book club is open to all and meets in the Center's main building at 650 FM 1011 in Liberty. Home to extensive archival holdings documenting Southeast Texas, a library collection and a museum, the Center offers an ideal setting for discussions about novels tied to these fields. Each meeting will be led by SHC staff.

The Texas Master Naturalist program is a volunteerbased organization dedicated to developing a well-informed volunteers who provide education, outreach, and service dedicated to the beneficial management of natural resources and natural areas within their communities. Trainees will receive comprehensive training in a variety of subjects, including ecology, botany, zoology, geology, water resources and conservation practices to equip you with the knowledge and skills to understand and protect Texas's diverse ecosystems.

Beyond the classroom, trainees have opportunities to participate in hands-on conservation projects like habitat restoration, trail maintenance, and citizen science initiatives, educate the public through interpretive programs, nature walks, and community events and contribute to scientific research by collecting data and
